# CONSTITUTION

1. The Society shall be called "Pathhead and District Horticultural Society".
2. The Society shall be under the management of a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Show Manager and a Committee (six to form a quorum), who shall be elected for a fixed term of 2 years and shall be eligible to seek re-election if they so wish.
3. The committee shall have the power to add to their numbers.
4. Membership £5.00 (November to October) by annual subscription. Life membership £50 by single payment. Honorary membership by invitation of the management committee.
5. For the confined classes, intending competitors must reside and exhibits must be grown within the districts of Crichton, Cranstoun, Ford, Humbie and Fala. This restriction does not apply to those competing in the open classes.

## RULES FOR ANNUAL SHOW

1. Entries free to members and children.
2. All entries should be received by the Show Manager before 9.30am on the day of the show.
3. Entry cards, upon which the Competitor shall write his/her, name and address, will be placed by the exhibit, showing the class number only. Cards will be supplied.
4. Experienced judges shall be appointed and their decision will be final.
5. No prize will be awarded for any exhibit which is not in accordance with the Schedule. The judges are empowered to withhold prizes from any exhibit which may be of insufficient merit. Exhibits to be judged on quality, except where otherwise stated.
6. The Hall will be open for staging of exhibits between the hours of 7.00pm and 10.00pm on Friday and 7.00am until 9.30am on the Saturday of the show.
7. Protests must be lodged with the Show Manager in writing no later than 3pm on the day of the show before a protest can be considered.
8. No exhibitor, when competing, will be allowed to send more than one entry for the same prize.

9. No exhibits to be removed before the closing hour - 4.30pm.
10. Each exhibitor must sign the Declaration on the entry form, that the products exhibited in the Horticultural Section are bona fide his/her own growth, and have been in his/her possession for at least four months previous to the day of the Show. (Flowers for Decorative Section excepted). Handicraft exhibits must not have been previously exhibited at this Show and must be the exhibitor's own work.
11. Anyone infringing any of the rules shall be liable to forfeit all subscriptions paid; prizes gained, and may be expelled by the Society.
12. Prize money will be paid out in the Community Hall, Pathhead, on the day of the show from 3.00pm until 4.30pm.

## SELKIRK BANNOCK RECIPE - Class 109

### Ingredients:

8oz plain flour, 1/4-pint milk, 2oz lard, 1/2oz yeast, 2oz sugar, Pinch of salt, 4oz sultanas, 1/2oz mixed peel.

### Method.

Sift flour and salt in warm bowl and stand in warm place to make flour warm. Melt lard in saucepan, add milk, bring to blood heat. Mix one teaspoon of sugar (from 2oz) with yeast to thin cream, pour warm milk and lard over it. Make a hollow in centre of flour and gradually pour in liquid (yeast, milk, lard and sugar).

Work in flour gradually stirring from centre to a fairly soft dough. Turn onto floured board and knead about five minutes.

Put dough back into greased basin, cover with a damp cloth and leave in warm place for an hour or more until dough has doubled in bulk. Turn onto floured board again. Mix fruit and remaining sugar and knead into dough.

Now form dough mixture into one large or two small rounds. Place on greased baking tray, again stand near heat for 10-15 minutes till it rises slightly and has a puffy texture.

Bake in hot oven 200 degrees for 15 minutes, reduce heat to 180 degrees, and bake for a further 25 minutes.

Bannock should be golden brown.

Brush over top with a glaze (1 level dessertspoon of caster sugar to 1 dessertspoon of boiling water).

Cool on wire tray.

The above recipe is using fresh yeast. To use dried active yeast, sprinkle  $\frac{1}{2}$  tablespoon of yeast and 1 tsp from sugar onto milk which has been heated to blood temperature, whisk thoroughly, leave in warm place for 15 minutes, when it will have frothed up, whisk again and along with the lard which has been melted separately add to flour and continue as above.

## **A Twiddle Muff - Class 121**

**Twiddlemuffs help occupy the hands of dementia sufferers, helping with agitation and frustration.**

**You will need: A selection of leftover and odd balls of yarn, oddments of various textures of yarn such as chunky, mohair, ribbon.**

**Needles: 8mm circular or 6.5mm straight needles.**

**Beads, zips, ribbons or anything that can be twiddled but will not break and are not sharp.**

**Directions:**

**Cuff: Cast on 45 stitches using two strands of double knitting yarn or one strand of chunky yarn (one plain colour works best). Work in stocking stitch (knit a row, purl a row) for 11 inches (28cms).**

**Muff body: Continue working with stocking stitch, or try mixing your knit and purl stitches to create a moss stitch, rib, cables and basket weave stitches or use oddments of various textures of yarn such as chunky, mohair, ribbon etc. until the work measures 23 inches(58.5cm). Cast off. The finished length should be roughly twice the width.**

**Finishing: If working with straight needles, neatly join the long sides together using edge to edge stitch (with the wrong side facing out). Turn inside out and push the one colour cuff up inside the muff body. Sew the two ends together using a neat edge to edge stitch. You should now have completed the tube shape.**

**Decoration: Try to include at least six decorations on the outside and include four or five bits and bobs on the inside too. You can add more if you like. Make sure everything is sewn on tight so they cannot be pulled off and there are no loose threads.**
